Chairman's Column

Once again, it's been a great summer around the lakes. The weather has been hot (maybe a bit too much!!) and the activity around the lakes has been in full bloom. We held our spring meeting in person the last Saturday in April (the week <u>before</u> Memorial Day!) and also simulcast the meeting via a Zoom call. We had 75 people in attendance with 8 joining via the Zoom connection. It certainly was great to be able to get back together again after our challenges in 2020.

BPLA has been active throughout the summer. We helped sponsor the July 4th weekend festivities which included our annual boat parade on each lake and the fireworks on the evening of July 3rd. On July 17th, BPLA hosted its annual membership picnic at the Narrows Picnic area. We had 60 people attend the picnic to enjoy the great food and mingle with their neighbors at the lake. A special shout out to Ron Redding for coordinating everything and to Dan Frey for helping bring it all together on Saturday.

Buffer Zone activity is in full gear with projects planned on both lakes. Maria has details on the activities further outlined in her section in the Pine Views this month. BPLA also partnered with Aitkin County and numerous volunteers to update the plantings in the existing buffer zone near the picnic area by the Narrows. We added 120 new plants into the area after removing a number of trees and unwanted plants. In July, BPLA also had the opportunity to host a COLA (Coalition of Lake Associations) meeting on Big Pine Lake to share our buffer zone development story with other lake associations in the area. We had attendees representing Grindstone Lake Association, Wyndemere Lake Association, and Pokegama Lake Association on hand, in addition to attendees representing Pine County Soil & Water. They were impressed with BPLA efforts to date and asked many questions about how our buffer zone development process works.

Our Fall Membership meeting is right around the corner. It is scheduled for **Saturday, August 28**th at the Finlayson Community Center from 9:15 – 11:00. Doors will open with coffee and rolls at 8:30 am. We will also be offering a ZOOM call in for those who would like to join remotely. Details regarding the Zoom call will be distributed to association members via email the week prior to the meeting. If you have questions about the meeting, please reach out to one of your BPLA Board members. The meeting will include updates from your BPLA board on key topics of information related to the association.

Walleye Stocking Update

I recently contacted the stocking vendor we selected to supply walleye fingerlings. The company is located in the Spicer-New London area of Minnesota. Because of this year's drought conditions, he is experiencing problems raising this year's walleye fingerlings. He has had to move some young walleyes from ponds that were drying up. No rain has increased Filamentous algae growth. Also, clear water has encouraged heavy lake plant growth. Both of these will cause low oxygen levels later in the summer as they die off, potentially killing off the walleyes in the ponds affected. He plans to aerate the ponds but indicates its more to make him feel like he is doing something to increase the oxygen for the walleyes then supplying enough oxygen to help. They are currently checking the walleye in the ponds to find out how they are surviving these difficult conditions. The walleye are currently small so counts are not possible. They are looking for schools of the small walleye fry. He reassured me that his intent is to stock our lakes with the fingerlings we ordered. I will keep following up on their status.

As a reminder, our Fall Membership meeting is right around the corner. The meeting is scheduled for Saturday, August 28th at the Finlayson Community Center. Social time starts at 8:30 with donuts and coffee, the actual meeting starts at 9:15 am.

Water Quality Update

Thank you for your dues and other financial contributions. This allows us to continue the water testing to monitor the water quality of our lakes. My wife Pat and I have been sampling the water at six locations in our lakes and creeks since September of 2013. We have it tested for the nutrients nitrogen and phosphorus, which are indicators of the amount of nutrients available for algae and plant growth. Chlorophyll is also tested, which is an indicator of the actual algae in the water.

In general, the test results show a trend toward better water quality over the past few years. We've done sampling twice this year so far, which revealed some surprisingly good Secchi Disc readings, which is a measure of water clarity. These readings have been up to twice the depth of readings in recent years (11.5) feet in the south lake, for example). This is likely an anomaly due to weather conditions which can affect test results. The drought this summer may have something to do with that. The recreational quality of the water remains good. It is likely that the trend toward improved water quality is due to the efforts of many of you through good septic system maintenance, minimizing or eliminating fertilization of your lawn, and installation of shoreline buffers. Ongoing efforts like these by everyone around the lakes will help to keep the recreational quality of our lakes in good shape.

Saint Urho in September? Varmasti!

First off, I would like to pass along an invitation: It's the Annual Celebration of Saint Urho's Day! To be held in Finlayson on Saturday, September 18, 2021. Thinking ahead, some of you may have closed up the cabin for the season and bid farewell to the Big Pine Lake community until next year. Locals may be celebrating the "noise" of summer finally quieting. Still, others may look forward to continued visits to the lake and the many activities to be had in fall and winter. Here is another exciting event to mark on the ol' calendar. But Saint Urho in September?

During a normal year, one would hardly think about Saint Urho in September. In fact, this fictional saint of Finland is actually celebrated on March 16, making it a popular date to many Finnish Americans living in northern Minnesota. There are several historical references that share how this legend was created. One of those stories centers on Richard Mattson and Gene McCavic of Virginia, Minnesota. In 1956, these men created Saint Urho and attributed his success to saving the Finnish grape crops from an infestation of frogs. Saint Urho would be saluted for ridding Finland of 'those frogs' with his loud voice.

Now March 16 was not even the initial date set to celebrate Saint Urho. Some sources, including his original Ode, suggest May 24. Yet, Mattson and McCavic frequently compared Saint Urho and his actions to those of Saint Patrick, who is celebrated for, among other things, having driven snakes out of Ireland. So, the date was later moved from May to March and falls one day before Saint Patrick's Day... now the Finns would start celebrating (and drinking green beer?!) one day earlier than the Irish.

As with many legends, they evolve over time and become a mixture of truth, myth, and symbolism. One noteworthy difference in the modern day legend is that Saint Urho drove out grasshoppers instead of frogs to save the grape crops. His loud voice was developed by drinking sour milk and eating fish soup. He carried a pitch fork to chase away any grasshoppers who were not scared of his voice.

Regardless of differences, the legend lives on to represent a means to celebrate the Finnish heritage and the Finlayson-Giese Lions Club is known to be the primary sponsor of our local event, which was first held in 1985.



For those unaware, Lions International was developed in 1917 with a common mission to serve. Lions International includes nearly 48,000 local clubs and 1.4 million members who "give their valuable time and effort to improving their communities and the world." The Finlayson-Giese Lions Club was chartered in 1983 and has contributed countless volunteer hours and financial support to the local community and has helped raise awareness for many national causes such as diabetes, childhood cancer, and disaster relief. But, Saint Urho in September? Well, we all know that the past 18 months have been difficult with many public events cancelled. So, it is with great excitement that the Finlayson-Giese Lions Club announces the rescheduling of the 2021 St. Urho's Day Celebration - complete with the Antique Car & Motorcycle Show, bake sale, outdoor game tournaments, and lots of other activities for the entire family. It should be noted, again, that this event is a reschedule and the 2022 celebration is still on its normal schedule for March 19, 2022. tradition and as a means to give more people a chance experience the tradition, Finlayson-Giese celebrates St. Urho the Saturday following the actual day.

So about that invite... definitely an experience to consider as summer winds down, boats and docks get put away, your favorite new swimsuit gets tossed deep into the drawer, and you prepare to put Santa back up on the roof. Okay... too much too soon? Just remember to keep all your green and purple attire accessible. Make sure your favorite cape is washed and pressed. Tell Alexa to wake you up early on the 18th so you can get the family together and come celebrate a legend. But Saint Urho in September? Varmasti (Most certainly)!
